If you would like to order, you need to scan the QR code on the small white card that your child brought home and follow the instructions on the website. All orders must be placed online; we cannot order from school unfortunately.

Public Health Advice

Due to the ongoing waste and recycling service industrial action, rubbish has continued to accumulate across Birmingham. Residents may be impacted by the industrial action in different ways, however the public health risk associated with household waste can be reduced by taking the following precautions:

- Good hygiene is important to reduce risk of becoming ill from bugs, in particular regular hand washing with soap and water.
- Keep food preparation areas clean using a disinfectant, don't leave food on surfaces at home unwrapped, including pet food and use bin lids as accumulated waste can attract flies.
- Use two bin bags, especially when preparing waste for taking outside as this reduces the risk of vermin breaking into bin bags.
- In particular, ensure waste products such as nappies, sanitary towels and condoms are 'double bagged' for example put in a smaller bag first before placing in the household rubbish bin.
- Use gloves if you pick up rubbish that has spilled into your driveway or street.
- Take extra precaution with children who may be playing in areas near where rubbish has accumulated and especially if you notice exposed waste.
- Where possible, keep wheelie bins / outside bins out of direct sunlight to reduce smells and in a place that minimises obstruction to others.
- If you or your child cuts themselves on waste in the street, wash the wound thoroughly with soap and water and apply a sterile adhesive dressing, such as a plaster. Visit the <u>NHS website information about how to deal with cuts</u>. If there is a risk the wound could become infected or you think it is already infected call NHS 111 or visit your local walk-in centre, minor injuries unit or GP surgery or download the free 'Ask NHS' app for advice if you begin to feel unwell.

Year 6 SATs Week

Year Six SATS will take place during the week of $12^{th} - 16^{th}$ May. It is VERY IMPORTANT that your child is in school for the whole of this week, and also that they are in on time each day. To help with this, we will provide a free breakfast club for all Y6 children for the duration of the week. Research has shown that a good, healthy breakfast improves brain function and helps children to function better in their lessons! We will send out a letter to Y6 families regarding this after the Easter break.

Holy Week/Easter

Today is Holy or Maundy Thursday, which marks the second special day in Holy Week, the most important week in the Church year. Holy Week is the week leading up to Jesus' death, and resurrection on Easter Day. There are five special days in Holy Week on which Christians go to church; Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday and Easter Sunday. These days remember special events in the Easter story.

Maundy Thursday is the day on which Jesus shared the Last Supper with his disciples. It was the Jewish feast of Passover, and Jesus broke bread and shared wine with the disciples. This is an important event for the church, as it was the first celebration of the Mass, where Jesus told the disciples (and us) 'Do this in memory of me'. Jesus told the disciples that when they did, the bread would become his body and the wine would become his blood; the sacrifice which he was going to make. Jesus also washed the disciples' feet, to show them that he was the 'servant of mankind'. If you go to Mass tonight, you will see Father Solomon washing the feet of people in the congregation to remember this act. Jesus went to the Garden of Gethsemane to pray



on Holy Thursday, and it was here that Judas (one of the disciples) betrayed Jesus by bringing the soldiers to arrest him. At the Maundy Thursday Mass, the Eucharist (communion) is taken from the altar and taken to a side chapel. Everything is removed from the altar in preparation for Good Friday, which is a day of mourning in the church. People sometimes stay after the service to pray, as Jesus asked the disciples to pray with him in the garden.



Good Friday was the day on which Jesus was crucified. Good Friday is a day of mourning in church, and traditionally, people choose to fast or not eat certain food and drink. This is where the tradition of 'Hot Cross Buns' came from, as people would eat these on Good Friday as a simple alternative to other foods, the cross on the bun representing the cross on which Jesus died. We do not have Mass on Good Friday, but we go to a solemn, simple service, which is traditionally held at 3.00pm. This is the time that Jesus is believed to have died. If you go to church on this day, you will see Father Solomon holding the cross for people to kiss. This is called 'veneration', which means to worship, and it is done as a symbol of adoration and honour for Jesus and what he did for us. On Good Friday, Jesus

was questioned by the Jews after his arrest, who believed that Jesus was a troublemaker and a sinner, as he claimed to be the Son of God. They wanted Jesus to be punished, but were not allowed to do it themselves, so they handed him over to the Romans. Despite giving the crowd many opportunities to free Jesus, Pilate, who was the Governor of Rome, eventually gave in and sent Jesus to be flogged and crucified. The Gospels tell us that Jesus was mocked and given a purple robe to wear (the colour of Kings and royalty) and a crown of thorns. This is because they said that Jesus claimed to be the King of the Jews. Jesus carried his own cross to the place where he was crucified, known as 'Golgotha' or 'the place of the skull'. After Jesus died and was taken from the cross, he was placed into the tomb.

On **Holy Saturday**, we celebrate the 'Easter Vigil'. This is the first Mass of Easter. The word vigil means to keep watch and wait, as we are awaiting the resurrection of Jesus, the light of the world. At the Easter Vigil Mass, Fr. Solomon lights a special fire. He blesses the fire and lights the new Paschal Candle from it. The Paschal Candle represents Christ as the light of the world. It is lit every week throughout the season of Easter, up until Pentecost Sunday. It is also lit at special times throughout the year, such as funerals and baptisms. If you go to Mass on this day, you will also see the veils being removed from the statues and crucifixes in the church, and the Eucharist being brought back to the altar. You will also notice that we use the 'Alleluia' again, which you will remember that we buried at the beginning of Lent. This is a time of great joy and celebration; the most important day in the year of the church.



The staff and I would like to wish you all a very Happy and Holy Easter and we hope the children enjoy the Easter treats which they have brought home with them today. These sweet treats were kindly donated by another Birmingham primary school as part of their Jubilee year commitment.
